

Anaphylaxis Management Policy

1. Purpose

Anaphylaxis is a severe and potentially life-threatening allergy that can affect more than one body system simultaneously. Our purpose is to provide a safe and supported environment in which students at risk of Anaphylaxis can participate equally in all aspects of performing arts. Although not mandated, CentreStage is committed to complying with Ministerial Order 706 and associated guidelines published by the Department of Education and Early Childhood.

2. Aims

- To raise awareness of Anaphylaxis
- To provide wherever possible, a safe and supportive environment so that students at risk of Anaphylaxis have equal opportunity to take part in performance life
- To engage and collaborate with parents/carers of students at risk of Anaphylaxis, to assess and minimise risk for their student and develop management strategies for them
- To ensure that each staff member has adequate knowledge about allergies, Anaphylaxis and Centrestage's policy and procedures in responding to an Anaphylaxis event

3. Implementation

Centrestage Pty Ltd require an Individual Action Plan (ASCIA Action Plan), signed by a medical practitioner to be provided for students at risk of Anaphylaxis. This is to be provided prior to or at the first class attended by the student. This will be displayed in staff and student working areas. In consultation with parents/carers, an Individual management plan will be developed for each student at risk of Anaphylaxis.

At Centrestage, we believe that managing a serious health alert such as Anaphylaxis is a joint responsibility and effort with parents/carers. For us to adequately care for your child, all involved should take reasonable steps to:

- Share information regarding the student's medical condition
- Prevent an Anaphylactic incident
- Respond in a timely, informed and appropriate manner, if an incident does occur

Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plans

The Centrestage Owner will ensure that an 'Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plan' is developed in consultation with a student's parents/carers, for any student who has been diagnosed by a medical practitioner as being at risk of Anaphylaxis.

The Plan will be in place as soon as practicable after the student enrolls with Centrestage.

The Individual Anaphylaxis Plan will be set out in the format used by the Australian Society of Clinical Immunology and Allergy (ASCIA). See 'Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plan' (Appendix A). It should include the following:

- a. Information about the student's medical condition that relates to an allergy and the potential for an anaphylactic reaction, including the type of allergy or allergies the student has (based on a written diagnosis from a medical practitioner).
- b. Strategies to minimise the risk of exposure to known and notified allergens while the student is under the care or supervision of Centrestage staff, including for in-school and off-site activities, such as, at camps and excursions, or at special events conducted, organised or attended by Centrestage.
- c. The name of the person/s responsible for implementing the strategies.
- d. Information on where the student's medication will be stored.
- e. The student's emergency contact details.
- f. An 'ASCIA Action Plan' provided by the parents/carers that:
 - Sets out the emergency procedures to be taken in the event of an allergic reaction
 - Is signed by a medical practitioner who was treating the child on the date the practitioner signs the Plan
 - Includes an up to date photograph of the student.

Review of Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plan:

A student's Individual Management plan will be reviewed, in consultation with the student's parents/carers in all of the following circumstances:

- a. Annually.
- b. If the student's medical condition, in so far as it relates to allergy and the potential for anaphylactic reaction, changes
- c. As soon as practicable after the student has an anaphylactic reaction at Centrestage
- d. When the student is to participate in an off-site activity, such as camps and excursions, or at special events conducted, organised or attended by the school (e.g. class parties, elective subjects, cultural days, fetes, or incursions)

Responsibility of Parents/Carers:

- a. Provide the ASCIA Action Plan.
- b. Inform the school in writing of their child's medical condition, in so far as it relates to allergy and the potential for anaphylactic reaction, changes and if relevant, provide an updated ASCIA Action Plan.
- c. Participate in a yearly review of their child's Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plan.
- d. Provide an up to date photo for ASCIA Action Plan when that Plan is provided to the school and when it is reviewed.
- e. Provide the school with an Adrenaline Auto-injector such as an EpiPen® that is current and not expired for their child.

Risk Minimisation and Prevention Strategies:

Centrestage will ensure that risk minimisation and prevention strategies are in place for all relevant in-school and out-of-school settings which include (but are not limited to) the following:

- In the class room
- Between classes and other breaks
- In the kitchen area
- Before and after class
- Special events including incursions, cultural days, fetes or class parties, excursions and camps.

IN-SCHOOL SETTINGS

Studios/Classrooms	
1	Copy of students' Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plans are displayed in their classrooms, Performance spaces and in a folder for staff
2	NEVER give food from outside sources to a student who is at risk of anaphylaxis.
3	No nuts should be brought into CentreStage/Vines Rd Community Centre – we are a “nut aware” business.
4	Regular discussions with students about the importance of washing hands, eating their own food and not sharing food.
5	Students at risk of Anaphylaxis should have easy access to their bag which should contain their EpiPen®.
Kitchen area/vending machine	
1	The vending machine at Rodney Rd provides a range of products that exclude peanut or other nut products in the ingredient list. The vending machine at Vines Rd is not owned or stocked by Centrestage. We cannot guarantee that foods inside it are nut free or clearly labelled. It is not recommended for children from Centrestage to make purchases from this machine.
2	Benches and surfaces are sanitised daily at the cessation of classes
3	A ‘no sharing of food’ approach is adopted.
4	Awareness of contaminating other foods when preparing, handling or displaying food.
Centrestage Grounds/Vines Rd Community Centre	
1	Sufficient supervision of a student who is at risk of anaphylaxis by a staff member who is trained in the administration of an Adrenaline Auto-injector.
2	Adrenaline Auto-injectors and Individual Anaphylaxis Plans are easily accessible from their class room.

3	A Communication Plan is in place for staff medical information can be retrieved quickly and all staff are aware how to inform the Owner and Head of Tuition if an anaphylactic reaction occurs
4	Students with anaphylactic responses to insects are encouraged to stay away from water or flowering plants.
5	Lawns are mowed regularly and outdoor bins covered.
6	Students are encouraged to keep drinks and food covered while outdoors.
OUT-OF-SCHOOL SETTINGS	
Field trips, excursions, other performance spaces	
1	Sufficient staff trained in the administration of an Adrenaline Auto-injector to attend.
2	Appropriate methods of communication must be discussed.
3	Identify the location of the Adrenaline Auto-injector i.e. Who will carry it? How will it be delivered to the student?
4	Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plans and Adrenaline Auto-injectors are to be easily accessible and staff must be aware of their location.
5	Risk assessment of the activity must be completed prior to departure.
6	Teacher in Charge should consult parents/carers of students at risk of Anaphylaxis in advance to discuss issues that might arise, to develop an alternative food menu or request the parents/carers provide a meal (if required).
7	Review Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plans prior to departure to ensure that it is up to date and relevant to the particular excursion or activity.
8	Students who are at risk from insect bites and stings should be encouraged to wear appropriate protective clothing.
9	First Aid Kits and mobile phones will be taken on every out-of-school activity.

Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plans and Auto-injectors are located in the following locations:

At Warehouse 26: In the First Aid Cupboard in the kitchen

At Vines Road: With teaching staff in the portable first aid kit

The following information is available in the Centrestage Emergency Management Folders:

- A complete, up to date list of students identified as having a medical condition that relates to allergy and the potential for anaphylactic reaction.
- The information contained in Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plans (Original Plans located in the student's individual central file).

It is the responsibility of the Teacher-In-Charge at Vines Rd, or of a camp or excursion to ensure that all relevant medical information, medicines and equipment are available and that all supervisors and staff members are familiar with those students at risk of anaphylaxis.

School Management and Emergency Response:

If an Adrenaline Auto-injector is administered, the school must:

1. Immediately call an ambulance 000
2. Lay the student flat and elevate their legs. Do not stand or walk. If breathing is difficult for them allow them to sit but not stand.
3. Reassure the student experiencing the reaction, as they are likely to be feeling anxious and frightened as a result of the adrenaline. Watch the student closely in case of a worsening condition. Ask another staff member to move other students away and reassure them elsewhere.
4. In the rare situation where there is no marked improvement and severe symptoms are present, a second injection may be administered after five minutes, if a second Adrenaline Auto-injector is available.
5. Then contact the student's emergency contacts.
6. Notify the Owner or the Head of Tuition.
7. Document the incident and provide information to a medical practitioner.
(Refer to ASCIA 'Action Plan for Anaphylaxis' - Appendix B)

Centrestage will purchase spare Adrenaline Auto-injectors for general use and as a back-up to those supplied by parents/carers.

Communication Plan:

The Owner of Centrestage will be responsible for ensuring that a 'Communication Plan' is developed to provide information to all staff, students and Parents/Carers about anaphylaxis and the school's Anaphylaxis Management Policy.

The Communication Plan will include information about what next steps will be taken to respond to an anaphylactic reaction by a student in various environments including:

- During normal school activities, including in the classroom, in the school grounds, in all Centrestage buildings and sites.
- During off-site or out-of-school activities including, on excursions, school camps and at special events conducted or organised by Centrestage.

The Owner of Centrestage will be responsible for informing volunteers and casual relief staff of students with a medical condition that relates to allergy and the potential for anaphylactic reaction and their role in responding to an anaphylactic reaction by a student in their care.

The Principal will ensure that all relevant staff are:

- Trained
- Briefed at least twice per calendar year.

Centrestage will raise awareness about Anaphylaxis in the community by providing information on our website. Parents/Carers will be given timely reminders about the school's Anaphylaxis Management Policy and the need for the school to be kept well informed about children at risk.

The school's Anaphylaxis Management Policy will be made available to all parents/carers through the CentreStage website.

Staff will raise student awareness through class discussions, providing the following key messages:

- Always take food allergies seriously – severe allergies are life threatening.
- Never share your food with your friends who have food allergies.
- Wash your hands after eating.
- Know what your friends are allergic to.
- If a school friend becomes sick get help immediately even if the friend does not want to.
- Be respectful of a school friend's Adrenaline Auto-injector.
- Never pressure your friends to eat food they are allergic too.

Staff Training:

The following school staff will be appropriately trained:

- Staff who conduct classes that have students with a medical condition that relates to allergy and the potential for Anaphylactic reaction.
- Any further school staff that are determined by the Owner.
- School staff must complete one of the following options below to meet the anaphylaxis training requirements of Ministerial Order 706 and record the dates training has occurred. CentreStage Performing Arts Academy will adopt Option Three

Please note: General First Aid training does **NOT** meet the anaphylaxis training requirements under MO706.

All staff will be briefed once each semester by a School Anaphylaxis Supervisor that includes:

- Pictures of the students at the school at risk of Anaphylaxis, their allergens, year levels and risk management plans that are in place
- Signs and symptoms of Anaphylaxis
- ASICA Action Plan for Anaphylaxis and how to administer an Adrenaline Auto-injector

- The school's First Aid Policy and emergency response procedures.

The briefing must be conducted by a member of the school staff, who has successfully completed an approved anaphylaxis management training course in the last 2 years.

Annual Risk Management Checklist

The Principal will ensure the Annual Risk Management Checklist is completed each year to ensure compliance with DET guidelines. (See Appendix G).

4. Definitions

Anaphylaxis: is a severe and sudden allergic reaction when a person is exposed to an allergen. Common allergens include:

- eggs
- peanuts
- tree nuts such as cashews
- cow's milk
- fish and shellfish
- wheat
- soy
- sesame
- latex
- insect stings and bites
- medications.

ASCIA Action Plan: This Plan is a nationally recognised action plan for anaphylaxis developed by the Australasian Society of clinical immunology and allergy. These plans are device specific, that is, they list the student's prescribed auto-injector e.g. Epipen ®

Individual Anaphylaxis Management Plan: An individual plan for each student at risk of anaphylaxis in consultation with the student's parent/carer and their medical practitioner to describe their allergy, symptoms, and the emergency response should the student display symptoms of an anaphylactic reaction.

5. Evaluation

This policy will be reviewed regularly by the leadership team at Centrestage with input from our CentreStage Advisory Group. It will also be reviewed based on any feedback received from parents/carers and any policy or guideline changes recommended by DET.


This policy was reviewed in January 2020. It is next due for review in 2021.

- Swelling of lips, face, eyes
- Hives or welts
- Tingling mouth
- Abdominal pain, vomiting (these are signs of anaphylaxis for insect allergy)

ACTION FOR MILD TO MODERATE ALLERGIC REACTION

- For insect allergy - flick out sting if visible
- For tick allergy - freeze dry tick and allow to drop off
- Stay with person and call for help
- Locate EpiPen® or EpiPen® Jr adrenaline autoinjector
- Give other medications (if prescribed).....
- Phone family/emergency contact




Mild to moderate allergic reactions (such as hives or swelling) may not always occur before anaphylaxis

WATCH FOR ANY ONE OF THE FOLLOWING SIGNS OF ANAPHYLAXIS (SEVERE ALLERGIC REACTION)

• Difficult/noisy breathing	• Difficulty talking and/or hoarse voice
• Swelling of tongue	• Persistent dizziness or collapse
• Swelling/tightness in throat	• Pale and floppy (young children)
• Wheeze or persistent cough	

ACTION FOR ANAPHYLAXIS

- 1 Lay person flat - do NOT allow them to stand or walk**
 - If unconscious, place in recovery position
 - If breathing is difficult allow them to sit

- 2 Give EpiPen® or EpiPen® Jr adrenaline autoinjector**
- 3 Phone ambulance - 000 (AU) or 111 (NZ)**
- 4 Phone family/emergency contact**
- 5 Further adrenaline doses may be given if no response after 5 minutes**
- 6 Transfer person to hospital for at least 4 hours of observation**

If in doubt give adrenaline autoinjector


Commence CPR at any time if person is unresponsive and not breathing normally

How to give EpiPen®



1 Form fist around EpiPen® and PULL OFF BLUE SAFETY RELEASE

3 PUSH DOWN HARD until a click is heard or felt and hold in place for 3 seconds REMOVE EpiPen®

All EpiPen®s should be held in place for 3 seconds regardless of instructions on device label





How to give EpiPen®





PUSH DOWN HARD until a click is heard or felt and hold in place for 3 seconds
REMOVE EpiPen®

SIGNS OF MILD TO MODERATE ALLERGIC REACTION

- Swelling of lips, face, eyes
- Hives or welts
- Tingling mouth
- Abdominal pain, vomiting (these are signs of anaphylaxis for insect allergy)

ACTION FOR MILD TO MODERATE ALLERGIC REACTION

- For insect allergy - flick out sting if visible
- For tick allergy - freeze dry tick and allow to drop off
- Stay with person and call for help
- Locate EpiPen® or EpiPen® Jr adrenaline autoinjector
- Phone family/emergency contact

- 3 Phone ambulance - 000 (AU) or 111 (NZ)**
- 4 Phone family/emergency contact**

- 6 Transfer person to hospital for at least 4 hours of observation**

If in doubt give adrenaline autoinjector

Commence CPR at any time if person is unresponsive and not breathing normally
EpiPen® is prescribed for children over 20kg and adults. EpiPen® Jr is prescribed for children 10-20kg

ALWAYS give adrenaline autoinjector FIRST, and then asthma reliever puffer if someone with known asthma and allergy to food, insects or medication has **SUDDEN BREATHING DIFFICULTY** (including wheeze, persistent cough or hoarse voice) even if there are no skin symptoms

All EpiPen®s should be held in place for 3 seconds regardless of instructions on device label
